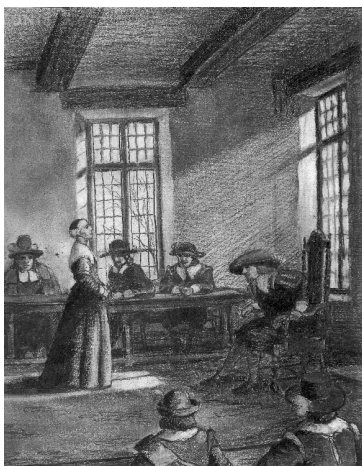

## Famed “suffrage army” marched through Bel Air

This year, on the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the passage of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment, people all over the country, as well as in Harford County, are celebrating this victory and telling the story of lesser-known suffragists.

In 1648, Margaret Brent, a successful St. Mary's County lawyer and landowner, stepped before Maryland's legislature and asked for the right to vote. Shocked male lawmakers denied her request on the spot.

Over the next 200 years, Maryland's women lobbied, marched and picketed in a determined battle for suffrage. They crisscrossed the state on foot and in trains, horse-drawn wagons, cars and boats to make the case that voting rights for women would bring social change and improve lives.

Many endured hecklers, assaults, community shunning and even jail sentences in unimaginable conditions. (Cont. on P. 3)

Dear neighbors:

It's easy to list the benefits that playgrounds and green spaces bring to our town. Our five neighborhood parks bring neighbors together, provide a shaded retreat, add property values to nearby homes and encourage play and exercise.

The best thing about our parks, though, is that they are places for fun.

By some standards, neighborhood parks – Alice Anne, Homestead, Major's Choice, Plumtree and Shamrock – are small. They range from .5 to 7 acres. Rockfield Park, a community park, is 53 acres. However, they are important and popular parts of our neighborhoods and worthy of continued investment.

You will see ongoing improvement at Plumtree Park, where there is up-to-date playground equipment and newly planted trees.

We plan to look at how to enhance the park's equipment and landscaping. All are welcome to join us. If it rains, we will meet at Town Hall.

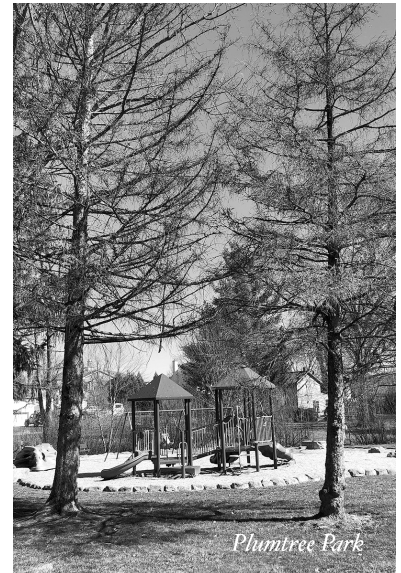

These include Maryland Department of Natural Resources (DNR) grant programs including Community Parks & Playgrounds and Program Open Space. Nonprofit and private funders include the Greater Bel Air Community Foundation, Bel Air Lion's Club, Bel Air Rotary Club, Bel Air Recreation Committee, Dresher Foundation and the American Water Charitable Foundation.

We will continue to make sure that parks and playgrounds remain safe, environmentally friendly and fun for our residents and visitors.

Congress finally passed the 19th Amendment on June 4, 1919. It was ratified on August 18, 1920, though Maryland failed to do so until March 29, 1941.

Women won the ballot – and then set to work to educate the state’s new voters and to pursue other equal rights issues.

Though names of suffragists such as Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton are familiar, many others have been overlooked by history.

Bel Air played a role in one of the most notable suffrage events in history.

On February 22, 1913, the Army of the Hudson, a suffragist pilgrimage that started in New York City and destined for Washington D.C., passed through Bel Air. Headed by New Yorker Rosalie Jones, of the National American Woman Suffrage Association (NAWSA), the group travelled by horse-drawn carriage and on foot, stopping to give speeches and hand out literature. The journey drew both supportive and jeering crowds all along the way.

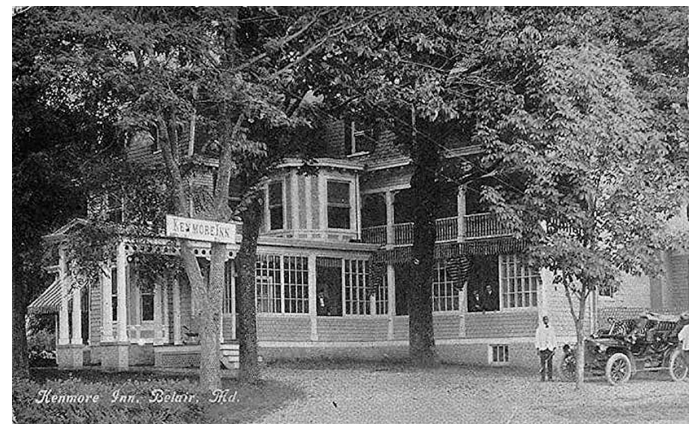
In Bel Air, the local chapter of the Just Government League was on hand to welcome them. Supporters included prominent citizens such as Miss Margaret Lake, Forest Hill; Mrs. Helen Harlan, wife of Judge Henry D. Harlan; Mrs. Rebecca van Bibber; Mrs. E. Estelle Moore of Fallston and Mary De Velasco Stump. Chief of Police John Jackson as well as Mayor Harry D. Hanway offered official greetings.

Ten days later, suffragists ended this grueling and muddy 200-mile journey in Washington D.C.

There, they joined over 5,000 suffragists in the National Woman Suffrage Parade procession, marching down Pennsylvania Avenue to Constitution Hall. Several blocks away, newly elected President Wilson was preparing for his inauguration. The women drew so many onlookers that the inauguration almost went unnoticed.

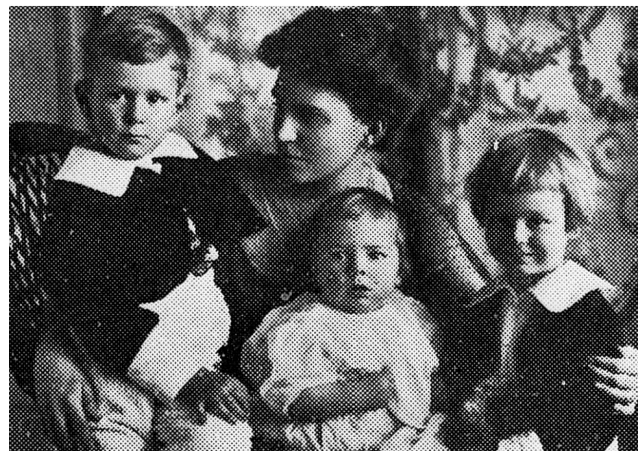

## Planning a night out in Bel Air? Put candle making on the itinerary

You can buy a ready-made scented candle at Aroma Candle Studio but, really, you can have so much more fun than that. Instead, choose a few of your favorite aromas from 86 unique scents, mix your own custom fragrance, pour wax into your chosen container and, finally, design a custom label for your candle creation.

Owners Marc and Wendy Mills guide you through each step. Their customers include those hunting for a one-of-a-kind gift, couples on date night, girlfriends out for an evening on the town, small groups and clubs, families with children as well as brides and grooms in search of unique wedding favors.

The beginning point, Marc says, is searching for just the right custom scent: "You take a clipboard and smell your way down the (fragrance display) walls. Write down 10 – 12 of your favorites, decide what size candle you want and come sit at the candle bar."

The Mills arrange fragrances in alphabetical order rather than grouping similar scents together. That way, you have a better chance to experience something unfamiliar such as yuzu, a citrus fruit and plant that once originated in China. You may also take whiffs of key lime pie, baked bread, bacon, sea breeze, champagne or lemongrass and more.

Once at the candle bar, the couple (or an employee) help customers narrow down 2 or 3 of their chosen

fragrances that work well together. You will blend the right proportions of scented oils, depending on the size of the candle you purchase. They then fill the candle container with wax, you stir in your custom blended oil, set the wick and create a customized label.

Many mass produced scented candles are a petroleum byproduct, with added chemicals so the scent lingers when the candle is not burning, says Wendy. Aroma Candle Studio uses soy wax. "We only add a sunscreen so the candle stays white. We don't add color."


Marc and Wendy relish their Main Street location as much as their newly opened business. They have lived in places across the country while following Marc's previous career in call center management. After several years in Harford County, they thought about their next move.

"We've never had roots too deep. We love Bel Air and decided to stay here," said Marc. He credits personalized business support from the Town of Bel Air's Department of Economic Development, Harford County Economic Development, the local Small Business Association, SCORE mentoring program and Freedom Federal, their lender, for helping them navigate their way to becoming first-time entrepreneurs.

Their business model reflects their passion for Main Street. Marc explains that finished candles need to sit for several hours before wick trimming and a heat process called glazing, which fills in air holes and cleans bits of wax from the glass vessel.

During that time, the couple encourages people to step out, shop and eat in downtown Bel Air while they wait. The Mills have been known to deliver finished candles to customers while they are shopping in other stores or dining in local restaurants.

*Aroma Candle Studio is located at 18 S. Main Street. Operating hours encourage people to stop in toward the end of the day, make a candle and step out to local restaurants while candles receive finishing touches. ## Capital projects shape up around Town

Curious about upcoming road construction, parks and infrastructure upgrades in Town? Bel Air's Board of Town Commissioners and staff meet regularly to discuss upcoming capital projects. All work sessions, Town Hall meetings as well as committee and commission meetings are open to the public. Commissioners encourage your feedback. Meeting agendas and minutes are posted online. Here are some capital projects that will be discussed in upcoming months.

- Repairs and upgrades to Rockfield Manor outbuildings, parking lots and playground
- Repairs and upgrades at the Bel Air Armory
- Upgrade of selected storm drain outfalls
- New sidewalk construction along south side of Gordon Street from Williams Street to Atwood Road; and then along Atwood Road from Gordon to Catherine Streets.
- Parking garage improvements (including installation of bike lockers) and resurfacing of the Hickory Avenue parking lot
- Rebuilding pumping stations at Kelly Avenue and Gateway Drive
- Improvements to Alice Anne Park, Homestead Park and construction of a new Office Street "pocket park." Replacement of trash cans at Shamrock Park
- Begin construction of new police facility at Town Hall
- Purchase of an electric vehicle for Town fleet
- "Share the Road" pavement markings along the primary bike routes; addition of bike lanes where applicable

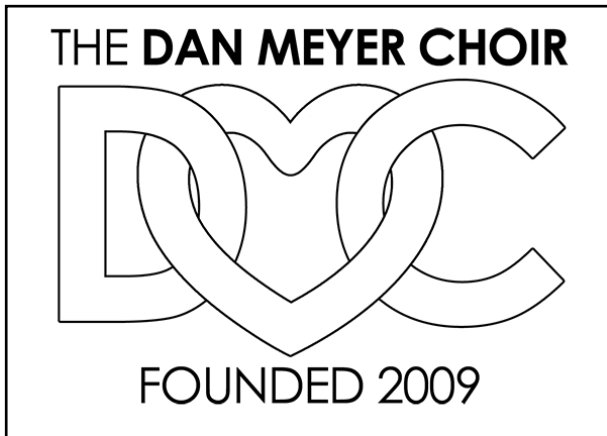
### What Level should you register for?

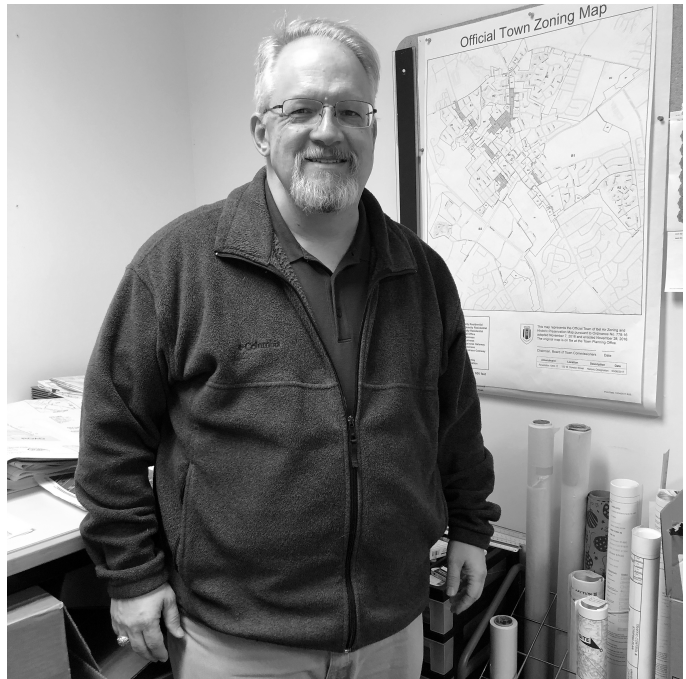

## 58 E. Broadway comes to life again

A number of narrow shotgun-style houses were built in Bel Air in the late 1800s. The surviving example at 58 E. Broadway is unique in that it was upgraded with an L-shaped veranda and once probably stood on Gordon Street until the early 1900s.

Records show that the dwelling, known as the Everett House, was well-cared for over the years. However, by the time Cindy Rybak was in the market for a fixer-upper in 2018, it had been vacant for two years and was filled with old furniture.

Ms. Rybak had a vision of what it could become. “The energy felt good” she said. “It gets natural light from lots of windows.” The location, steps away from Main Street, was unbeatable.

Within hours after settlement, Ms. Rybak arranged for a hauler to remove the contents and she got started on repairs, painting and carpet installation. Since the home is a designated historical property, Ms. Rybak appeared before the Town of Bel Air’s Historic Preservation Commission to get guidance on new siding and windows.

After the intense work, Ms. Rybak enjoys the positive comments that she receives: “We are at a point where we can breathe. The house was neglected and lost and pushed to the side. It is a loved house now.”
